

Lent... 40 days of awesome! The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which is March 1st this year.

The day before, Shrove Tuesday, has a much better profile in international folk culture though!

Lent was in ancient times a season of fasting as well as prayer and for centuries many foods such as meat and fish, fats, eggs, and milky foods were not eaten as part of the fasting tradition. The name "Shrove Tuesday" comes from the word "shrive", which means to confess and receive forgiveness. The need to eat up the fats gave rise to the French name *Mardi Gras* ('Fat Tuesday'). Pancakes were associated with Shrove Tuesday because they were an easy to prepare dish that could use up all the eggs, fats and milk in the house simply by adding flour.

Perhaps the most famous Pancake Race is held as a competition between Olney in Buckinghamshire and the town of Liberal in Kansas, USA. There is a marvelous tale that says pancake races began in Olney in the year 1445 when a woman had lost track of the time on Shrove Tuesday. She was busy cooking pancakes in her kitchen and suddenly she heard the church bell ringing to call the faithful to church for confession. She raced out of her house and ran all the way to church; still holding her frying pan and wearing her apron. There is a website for the event at www.olneypancakerace.org

The pancakes are a sign of making Lent a season of simpler lifestyle – cutting out the excesses of everyday life in order to become healthier people, both physically and spiritually.

Lent 2017 - resolve to keep it!

This year our key Lent activities are a variety of events and worship opportunities designed to help you set aside space in busy lives to recognise and keep the season of Lent:

Lent Lunches

Being held at Church House, Cornfield Drive every Wednesday in Lent, from 12.30pm. A soup, cheese and fruit lunch will be provided. Donations are asked towards the work of Christian Aid.

Lent Prayers in Church

These take place daily in our three churches on a rota basis. Church members lead these short (30-minute maximum) times of reflection and prayer. Readings and Prayer material are provided for use. Times and venues are on the Sunday Pew Sheet and on the Church website and Facebook page.

"WHAT ARE YOU DOING FOR LENT?"

A Lent Book

For those who find it difficult to commit to a regular weekly gathering for study we are recommending a book called "I am with you" by Kathryn Greene-McCreight (it was the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby's recommendation last year so we are playing catch up!) This book examines the biblical portrayal of God's presence among us as light in darkness. We are also offering occasional sharing groups (not compulsory) for those reading the book to meet together over coffee. Those who have ordered their copies should have them by now, copies are still available via Amazon online and versions for the kindle are also available for £2.98

Random Acts of Kindness

This project is an attempt to spread a little goodness and joy in the world since "Kindness starts with one!" Mark Twain said, "Kindness is a language which the deaf can hear and the blind can see". From positive sticky notes to thank you letters and with many more useful ideas we will be promoting a weekly RAK for everyone to use throughout Lent.

Saving Traditional Orchards in Your Area!

January 2017 Update Come and join us! We are continuing with our exciting three year project to restore and enjoy thirteen traditional orchards in Gloucestershire with the Three Counties Traditional Orchard Project (TCTOP), funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. We welcome volunteers of all ages to help us prune old and young fruit trees, plant heritage varieties (succession planting), record the wildlife, pick and juice the fruit, supply refreshments or give whatever time you can.

Gloucestershire has long been famous for its traditional orchards, but in the past 50 years over 80% have been lost. The Gloucestershire Orchard Trust has been instrumental in helping to reverse this trend and is delighted to be in partnership with TCTOP. Thanks to them, many project orchards across Gloucestershire, Herefordshire and Worcestershire will now flourish for many years to come. TCTOP have also kindly trained up Orchard Champions, who give extra special support and outreach to the community in association with Garden Organic.

The project orchards in Gloucestershire are in the Longney, Elmore, Epney, Framilode, Arlingham, Minsterworth, Gorsley and Kilcot areas. We especially welcome you if you are local and would like to get involved to enable specific orchard owners to look after their orchards. Under the expertise of experienced orchardist Martin, you would further your skills. Mentoring is an important part of the project; those who feel more confident over time can "buddy" the less sure so that knowledge and skills stay in the community. We also have good links with wildlife organizations, such as the Little Owl Project and Gloucestershire Raptor Monitoring Group.
